Value System

Value System - Meaning

A value system is a set of beliefs and principles that guide a person's actions and decisions, and describe what they consider important.

People develop their value systems over time, influenced by their experiences, family, friends, and culture

Personal values

Personal values

These are the principles that are most important to an individual and help them live a fulfilling life. They can include values such as compassion, creativity, generosity, loyalty, and gratitude.

Communal values

Communal values

These are the shared values of a community that shape local policies, interactions among members, and individuals' actions. They can include values such as respect for elders, honesty in trade, and kindness to strangers

Consistent value

A consistent value is a value that is the same across all objects that are instantiated.

For example, one might use a consistent value for each object to ensure that it is the same across all objects.

Internally Consistent

Internal consistency is a measure of how well a set of items or a test measures what it's intended to.

It can also refer to how well an organization's policies, code of conduct, and leaders' behaviors align.

Internally Inconsistent

Internal inconsistency can refer to a number of things, including:

In a system: When there is variation in the number or location of additional points, or when the same point is duplicated in a slightly different form.

In data: When there are inconsistencies that are not actually inconsistencies, but are instead caused by an incomplete understanding of how the data was generated.

In behavior: When someone does not behave in the same way every time a similar situation occurs.

In thought or actions: When someone is incoherent or illogical in their thought or actions.

In pay: When employees who do similar jobs within a company receive different pay.
