0100 PREAMBLE

Indian Social Science Academy (ISSA) organizes Indian Social Science Congress (ISSC) every year with a view to discovering, developing and disseminating science of Nature-Human-Society through critical appraisal and integration of current research and theory in all subjects of science taught and researched in Indian Universities, Colleges, IITs, IIITs, NITs, Regional Engineering Colleges, Medical Colleges, AIIMS, PGIs, NISERS, ISERS, CSIR, ICAR, ICPR, ICMR, ICSSR and ICHR Institutes/Laboratories for making India and its people creative, self-reliant, prosperous, healthy and happy while living in peace and harmony with Nature.

0200 HISTORY

Indian Social Science Academy was established on August 15, 1974 with its headquarters at Allahabad (now Prayagraj) with a view to creating a new science of Nature-Human-Society in India capable of creating new Self-Reliant(Atmanirbhar) democratic Republic of India free from hunger, disease, ignorance, discrimination, oppression of man by man. Two years later, it began organizing National Science Congress, Named as Indian Social Science Congress. First Indian Social Science Congress (then it was called All India Social Science Convention) was held from February 15 to 17, 1976 at Allahabad. Since then it has been held at different universities, details of which are given on page 71. The 40th session of the Indian Social Science Congress was held from December 19-23, 2016 at University of Mysore, Mysuru and the 41st session of it was held from December 18 to 22, 2017 at Periyar University, Salem. The 42nd Indian Social Science Congress was held from January 17-21, 2020 at Bengaluru Central University, Bengaluru, the 43rd Indian Social Science Congress was held from March 15-19, 2021 at Samrat Ashok Technological Institute, Vidisha (M.P.) and the 45th Indian Social Science Congress was held from March 15-19, 2021 at Samrat Ashok Technological Institute, Vidisha (M.P.) and the 45th Indian Social Science Congress was held from March 18SC had a focal theme, details of which are given on page 71.

All subjects/disciplines of science of Nature-Humans-Society are represented in Indian Social Science Congress. There are 28 Subject Research Committees and 21 Interdisciplinary Thematic Panels in it.

Word Science in Indian Social Science Congress is prefixed with social as science as knowledge is the result of collective mental and physical labour. Science is without any boundary and, is indivisible. Indian Social Science Congress, therefore, is indeed, science congress in true sense. Its focus is on 'Science of Nature-Human-Society'.

University Grants Commission recognizes Indian Social Science Congress at par with Indian Science Congress with distinction of having greater potentiality for developing new indigenous science and technology needed for self-reliant national development. Every session of Indian Social Science Congress has a focal theme. (P 71). Creative potentialities of people of India can flower **only** when Science Education and Research is carried in **All Indian languages**. The Indian Social Science Academy, therefore seeks to promote science education and research in **all Indian Languages** for flowering of the creative potentialities of all people of India which alone can enable them to liberate themselves and stand on their own feet. All those who are engaged in pursuit of science and all those who wish to pursue science are cordially invited to join the Indian Social Science Academy in order to build new science of Nature-Human-Society capable of making India and its people **Atmanirbhar**, **Happy** and **Creative**.

0400 FOCAL THEME

'75 Years of Swaraj India' is the focal theme of the 46th Indian Social Science Congress. Its details are given on page No. 24.

0500 OBJECTIVES

The Indian Social Science Congress is a multi-disciplinary national science Congress, which promotes integration of Science of Nature-Human-Society through intra, inter and multi-disciplinary appraisal and integration of current research and theory. Its deliberations, therefore, relate to (a) the focal theme, (b) current research and theory in each subject/discipline of Science, (c) inter and multi-disciplinary deliberations on the major India's and world's problems; (d) emerging areas of research and (e) improving the quality of education and research through capacity building programmes for young scientists. Specific objectives related to the focal theme, '75 Years of Swaraj India' are as follows:

- 0501: To comprehend the genesis and growth of Swaraj (self-rule) during struggles for freedom from British Raj.
- 0502: To understand Theory and principles of Swaraj/Democracy.
- 0503: To understand difference between theory and praxis of Swaraj in Post-British India.
- 0504: To assess political, economic, social and cultural developments and impact of the same on Swaraj India between August 15, 1947 and August 15, 2022.
- 0505: To examine Status of 'Education for All', 'Health For All' and 'Sabka Sath, Sabka Vikas' in Swaraj India.
- 0506: To assess state-of-art of indigenous Science and Technology in Swaraj India vis-à-vis national goal of reliance (Atmnirbhar Bharat) and Scientific Policy Resolution of 1958.
- 0507: To assess status of all Indian languages vis-à-vis education and research.
- 0508: To determine the Impact of 'Brain-Drain' and 'From Quit India' to 'Indians Quitting India on Swaraj India'.
- 0509: To examine Swaraj India's Movement from Centralisation to decentralization and thereby reducing the centre's control over the State and making the dream of Gram Swaraj real.
- 0510: To assess necessity, relevance and validity of privatization of Natural and Social Wealth in Swaraj India.
- 0511: To assess the growing problems of green energy and greenhouse effects, global warming and climate change in swaraj India.
- 0512: To examine the problems arising out of loss of bio-diversity, natural resources, desertification, floods and earthquakes in Swaraj India.
- 0513: To assess the national project for zeroing rural-urban divide and making Indian villages autonomous, self-sufficient, self-dependent happy and prosperous.
- 0514: To understand the dynamics of migrant labour including the labour in organized and unorganized sectors in Swaraj India.
- 0515: To determine the Status of undernourition, malnutrition, poverty, hunger and disease in Swaraj India.
- 0516: To determine the status of gainful employment of all able bodied Indians in Swaraj India.
- 1517: To assess neussity, relevance and validity of policy of contractualisation in Swaraj India.
- 0518: To asses nature and extent of Peoples Sovereignty over Jal-Jangal-Jamin in Swaraj India.
- 0519: To find out ecological and environmental conditions in Swarai India.
- 0520: To assess status of Social justice, communal harmony, non-violence, truth and love in Swaraj India.
- 0521: To identify all forms of roadblocks to forward march of Swaraj India and its people on the road of Swaraj happyness prosperity.
- 0522: To determine impact of Foreign Direct Investment and Make-India on self-reliant development of Swaraj India.
- 0523: To assess Swaraj India's status and international relations in today's Global World Order.
- 0524: To discover, develop and disseminate new science of Nature-Human-Society capable of enabling people of Swaraj India to overcome the road blocks and succeed in creating true Swaraj of their dream in near future.
- 0525: Any other.

1100. XI ALL INDIA YOUNG SCIENTISTS CONVENTION

Young Science Division of Indian Social Science Academy organizes All India Young Scientists Convention with a view to enabling our young scientists to play central role in development of indigenous science of Nature-Human-Society. So far ten sessions of it has been held. The XI All India Young Scientists convention will be held between January 27-31, 2023, during the 46th Indian Social Science Congress. 'Learning Science' will be its major theme. Besides, conditions of research facilities, availability of appropriate fellowships, language of education and research, contractual teaching and research, job opportunities, etc, will be sub-themes for Young scientists. Young scientists enrolled for Ph.D will be welcome to interact with the senior scientists for seeking advice.

Young scientists of all subjects are welcome to submit their papers and notes on specific issue/themes for discussion at the XI All India Young Scientists Convention. They are also welcome to submit papers on '75 Years of Swaraj India', the focal theme of XLVI ISSC. Two-three best papers will be listed for presentation in plenary sessions on '75 Years of Swaraj India'.

1200. EXHIBITION

An Exhibition on **indigenous innovations and discoveries in Science and Technology** will be held during the 46th Indian Social Science Congress. All the R&D organizations, CSIR, ICAR, ICMR, DST, ICSSR, ICPR, ICHR, IITs, NITs, Laboratories and universities are welcome to put their innovations, discoveries and innovation in any field related to problems of Nature-Human-Society in the exhibition.

There will be stalls highlighting the regional cuisine, arts and crafts, textiles, besides Book Exhibitions by leading Publishers.

1300. TASK FORCE

A Task Force constituted for the XLVI Indian Social Science Congress shall deliberate over its deliberations between 21:00 – 23:00 hours everyday with a view to exploring new ideas, theories, methods and social relevance. It will present its 'Trend Report' on January 31, 2023 at 14:00 hrs at the assembly of all delegates for discussion and adoption. All Chairpersons and Convenors are its ex-officio members.

1400. SUBMISION OF PAPERS

All university and college teachers, students and scientists working in CSIR, ICAR, ICMR, ICSSR, ICPR, ICHR, DST Institutes, IISc, IISERS, NISERS, IITs, IIITs, MNITs, Engineering Colleges, Medical and Health Science Universities, Medical Colleges, AIIMS, PGIs, Agriculture Universities, National/Regional Laboratories, DRDO's Institutes/Laboratories, are cordially invited to present their research papers at the 46th Indian Social Science Congress. Those who are not formal scientists too are welcome to submit their papers and participate in XLVI ISSC.

Papers can either be based on research or review of researches or study of policies and People's movements. Those who are working in the field and wish to present papers based on their field works too are welcome to present their papers. However, none is permitted to present papers by copying others' papers from research Journals or internet. Each paper, therefore, has to be accompanied by a duly signed 'Declaration Form' given in the annexure. Scientists found guilty of plagiarization shall be responsible for their acts.

Three hard copies of a paper, with CD and its abstract in triplicate or soft copy through e-mail should be submitted to the General Secretary, Indian Social Science Academy. Abstract of papers should be within 700-1000 words and the paper within 7000-10,000 words on format given in the annexure.

It is advisable to e-mail one copy of abstracts and papers to the respective Chairman of Research Committees/Thematic Panels and the General Secretary, ISSA in order to facilitate quick response (See pp 28-55). All papers are edited by the respective research committees/thematic panels. Provisional acceptance is issued on receipt of abstract of the paper and final acceptance after submission of the full paper and completion of registration. One should register only on receipt of provisional acceptance of one's abstract of paper.

1500. DATES FOR SUBMISSION OF PAPERS

The last date for submission of abstracts and full papers are as follows:

(i) Last Date For Submission of Abstract : November 15, 2022 (ii) Last Date For Submission of Full Paper : December 10, 2022

It may be noted that one can submit paper even after the last date and till January 15, 2023. No paper, however, will be received during the session of the 46thIndian Social Science Congress. The papers received after December 10, 2022 will be printed after the XLVI ISSC is over.

Since issue of visa is a time consuming process, the foreign scholars are advised to submit the abstracts of their papers before November 15, 2022 and the full paper before December 10, 2022 with their bio-data after visiting website of Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India

1600. MEDIUM

Papers can be submitted either in **Hindi** or in **English** as the Hindi and English are the official medium of Indian Social Science Congress. As a policy Indian Social Science Academy would like to have all Indian languages as the medium of exchange at ISSC. However, it doesn't have resources for it. Those, who cannot write in Hindi or English are welcome to write in their language. However, they are expected to **mail the original text of their papers along with its translated copy either in Hindi or English.**

1700. GOLD MEDALS

Two Gold Medals, namely, **A.K. Tharien Gold Medal** and **B.V. Rangarao Gold Medal** are available for the best papers presented at the XLVI Indian Social Science Congress. Two best papers of XLV ISSC adjudged by appropriate committee shall be given Gold Medals at the next session of Indian Social Science Congress in 2023.

Philanthropists/Trusts/Members are welcome to donate for creation of Gold Medals/Memorial Lectures in the names of their beloved.

1800. ACCOMMODATION AND FOOD

All registered delegates of XLVI Indian Social Science Congress shall be provided free Guest House / Hostel Accommodation and free food with effect from 26th January, 2023 (dinner only) to 1st February, 2023 (breakfast). One who is not a member but wishes to become member of the Indian Social Science Academy can send the membership fee and the registration fee meant for member-delegate along with filled-in membership and registration forms.

An institution/organization member can depute its three or more representatives to the Indian Social Science Congress. In the event of more than three representatives, the cost of registration for individual delegate (member or non-member) shall be payable by the concerned institution/organization.

Unregistered scholars attending XLVI Indian Social Science Congress shall be required to buy the food coupon from the counter. No accommodation and certificate shall be provided to unregistered scholars or scholars, who have registered without submitting any paper. No one will be entitled to receive literature of XLVI ISSC without registration. However, such scholars can buy the publications from the counter.

The Registered delegate is entitled to receive kitbags, all publications of the XLVI Indian Social Science Congress including its proceedings free of cost, free hostel accommodation, free meals, and free transport from the Guest House/Hostel to the venue of XLVI ISSC. The Organizing Committee may provide free or on payment transport from the railway station/airport to the Guest House/Hostel depending upon its resources. However, delegates staying in hotels on their own shall not be entitled for free transport. No outstation registered delegate shall be required to pay if the hotel accommodation is arranged by Bharathidasan University. All research students in receipt of DST/UGC/CSIR/ICSSR/ICHR/ICPR Fellowships shall meet their travel and registration fee from their contingency grants. Such research students, who are not receiving any fellowship, are advised to write to the General Secretary along with 'bona-fide' and 'non-receipt of Fellowship certificate' from their Registrar. Partial or full support will be provided on availability of fund. All Plenary speakers, Chairpersons/Conveners not having institutional support, are advised to inform the General Secretary at the earliest. Local Chairpersons/Convenors/Participants shall seek registration support from their universities/colleges/institutions. Bharathidsan University shall pay registration fee for its faculty and research students.

All requests for travel support will be considered by the appropriate committee and decision will be communicated by January 01, 2023.

No one without paper and without prior commitment by the General Secretary in writing shall be entitled for travel support and on the spot payment of the TA bill is subject to receipt of UGC' Grant before January 27, 2023 by Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirappalli. In the event of UGC's refusal to give its grant of Rs. 20,000,00/-Bharathidasan University shall disburse upto Rs.12,00,000/- for travelling expenses including registration fee of all the resource persons as per commitment to the plenary/public lecture/speakers/chairpersons and convenor/resource persons.

Request for travel support by scientists working in Universities/Institutes/Colleges will be considered on availability of funds. Such scholars would be expected to submit non-payment of TA and registration certificate by the Registrar/Principal/Finance Officer of their organizations.

A NOTE ON FOCAL THEME

"75 YEARS OF SWARAJ INDIA"

01. Preamble

The Indian Social Science Academy (ISSA) and Bharatidasan University have resolved to focus deliberations of the 46th Indian Social Science Congress, January 27-31, 2023 on **'Seventy Five Years of Swaraj India'** with a view to assessing quality of life, with equality, freedom, fraternity and dignity without fear of discrimination, oppression and violence in Swaraj India enjoyed by all sections of Indian population, while living and flowering creatively in peace and social harmony.

02. Context

India became free and independent from the British rule on August 15, 1947 after prolonged struggles for liberation from slavery after getting split into two countries-India and Pakistan by the British. Soon it will complete 75 Years of its independence. Seventy Five Years is a long time in the life of the nation and its people. It is a moment of great joy as well as reflection. The Government of India has rightly nicknamed it as 'Amrit Mahotsava' (Great Festival of Nector). What is expected from all sections of peoples of India is (a) to enjoy the celebration and (b) reflect over our achievements, successes and failures during past 75 years on the path of Swaraj with a view to learning lessons and working out course correction in order to accelerate the processes of establishment of true Swaraj. Indian Social Science Academy has resolved to join the celebration of Amrit Mahotsava through scientific reflections on successes and failures of our people in making Swaraj India a truly Swaraj India. What is a matter of joy is Bharathidasan University has extended its wholehearted and unconditional support to the Indian Social Science Academy in its endeavour to focus the deliberations of the 46th Indian Social Science Congress on '75 Years of Swaraj India'. ISSA looks forward for wholehearted unconditional support from all universities, colleges, research institutions, National Science Academies, Subject Associations, Farmers Associations, Trade Unions, NGOs, Industry, Commerce and Economics Association, Central and State Governments in its mission of scientific reflection without any prejudice.

At the dawn of independence, our leaders had resolutely decided that through state activities, the basic needs of the people could be provided within a short period contrary to the vision of M.K. Gandhi who reiterated that the transformative process of Indian society could be achieved through a conscientization and participatory process of the people. He firmly believed that the existing, Indian Social and economic crisis could be solved only through the participation of the people and not by the sole work of the state. Public institutions and the people have been driven to take guidance from the Constitution of India to regulate themselves while involving themselves in development initiatives and activities. Giving meaning to independence to the nation and people was more difficult and complex as Indian society was afflicted with a heavy hangover of the past and community practices that are antithetical to democracy and its core principle of equality. It is a pity that many could not realize that India inherited a rich cultural and civilizational values over centuries which could be harnessed to reconstruct the Indian society. The industrialization, modernization, westernization and now globalization have completely undermined the native initiatives and thereby India could not harness the power of the masses. Yet the growth of the public institutions expanded beyond proportion and their schematic activities have moved in an unstoppable way thereby India has successfully reduced poverty to some extent and created a battalion of beneficiaries and petitioners instead of creating honourable citizens with huge responsibilities. The above paradoxical positions created an impression among many of the intellectuals and political leaders that the sustainability of the Indian nation is always a question. Yet India stands in the comity of nations as a force to reckon with. The state market democracy and society have been vibrant and active by interacting with each other. Yet the major question remains unanswered. Has the Indian state through its institutional authority and actions regulated themselves and regulated the market forces to perform their duties and responsibilities to enable the people of India and more specifically the poor to lead a decent dignified human life. It is to be noted here that the Indian state established food security for 80 cores people through the public distribution system (PDS) by providing ration free of cost despite the economy achieving 8% economic growth. In the above backdrop, we celebrate 75 years of its march through "Amrit Mahotsava".

In the seventy-five years of democratic governance in India, it has witnessed two models of economic growth and addressed the development needs of the people through centralized plans. The state led and state and market led economic development models have not touched upon the poor substantially and hence the conscious economic advisors to the government declared that both state and market failed in their promises. The key question arises as to what extent the achieved economic growth has been distributed consciously to the needy to enable them to lead a decent human life with dignity. An assessment of the development that has taken place in science, technology, politics, governance, administration, economy, food production, environment, ecology, health, education, quality of life between 1947 and 2022 has to be done

by our scientific investigation. To move further, multilateral, bilateral and our government agencies have invested huge resources to collect data on the conditions of the people and the planet in the world. Substantial data have been collected, analysed and published in the form of reports. Huge data are on their respective portals without any analysis. Above data can be analysed by the scholars to understand the reality of the society. The published reports such as Antdoya survey report 2018, Caste census report 2011, Human Development Report, Climate Change Report, World Inequality Report, National Family Health Survey, World Hunger Report, NCAER Household Survey Report, CSDS Survey Report on Democracy, Constitution Review Committee Report, Centre-State Relations Committee Reports, Administrative Reform Commission Reports, Devolution Report, Vohra Committee Report and a few of the committee reports will help us to make a thorough analysis of the conditions of the people and the environment in which they live.

Against the above backdrop, the scientific community has a responsibility to investigate the issues pertinent to major achievements and failures in mitigating the problem of the people and suggest ways and means to move forward in reducing the plight of the people. To perform the above the investigation has to start analysing the relationship among state, market, and society and its implications on the planets and more specific nature. In the investigation process researchers, while touching upon the milestone in the transformative process of the Indian society, it is necessary to identify the loopholes in the process to perform policy advocacy. From the above way forward has to be suggested to move further in the journey of development. Thus it is proposed to focus the deliberations of the 46th Indian Social Science Congress on the wide gamut of the transformative process of the people and their institutions in the last 75 years in India on '75 years of Swaraj India'.

03. Concept of Swaraj

British ruled India from 1757 to 1947. Concept of Swaraj (Self-rule) evolved during the British rule. First, 'Freedom is our birth right' by Lokmanya Balgangadhar Tilak defined the major parameters of Swaraj. The struggle from the British Colonial rule contributed to further refinement of the concept of Swaraj. Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, was, the first to define it in his book 'Hind Swaraj' (1908) which was banned in 1910 by the British colonial rule. With passage of time Swaraj became alternative of State-rule. Freedom, equality, fraternity, cooperation not competition, collective ownership and not private ownership, truth, non-violence, love, stateless rule, etc. became the defining parameters of 'Swaraj'. Finally, 'democracy' replaced 'Swaraj' on the eve of British departure from India on August 15, 1947. What the British succeeded is they divided India into India and Pakistan on communal parameters, then constituted a constituent assembly for drafting the constitution. India declared itself as Democratic Republic on November 26, 1950 after approval of the constitution. Thus, independent India became Democratic Republic of India, by declaring Peoples of India as the sovereigns of India in following manner:

"We, the people of India...."..."...".

Thus, democracy became synonymous to 'Swaraj', blurring the distinction between the two. Peoples of India were promised self-rule (Swaraj) through the process of election after every 5 years. Swaraj cannot be created by the state machinery, it has to be achieved through a process of mobilization and participation of people. Acharya Vinobabhave had prepared a document "Swaraj Sastra" endorsed by M.K.Gandhi. In an independent country, how the liberated mass has to transform themselves and take responsibility to regulate themselves and participate in the governance and development process have been explained in the small document. It is to be noted that up to 1980 people have been mobilised consistently for party politics but never they have been mobilised for development. After 1990 theyhave been made the active consumer and passive spectators of the politics. Further the whole of vote bank politics and the franchise have been made as tradable commodities. After 1991, on the one hand globalization was initiated, on the other hand, *decentralization* was promoted through amending the constitution of India. Further development has been made as a right. Series of rights have been conferred on the poor and the marginalized. Yet the question is whether the enabling conditions have been created for the poor to claim their entitlements as rights. It is imperative on the part of the researchers to investigate into the functions of the state, market and the society and thereby find the solution to the existing crises.

04. Questions

Any scientific inquiry or reflection on 75 Years of Swaraj India demands objective answers to following three questions:

- 1. What was India prior to and on the eve of its independence on August 15, 1947?
- 2. What is Swaraj of India today after 75 Years?
- 3. What will Swaraj India be tomorrow or in near future?

Scientist's attempts to seek answers of these three questions shall raise hundreds and thousands of questions. Validity of answer shall depend upon rigour and depth of scientific inquiry/exploration and scientists conscious efforts to free their thoughts and actions from politics, religion and their social prejudices. Task is, indeed, formidable and risky.

What is crucial is discovery of correct dominant and dormant processes and structures prior to and during 75 Years of Swaraj.

08. Approach

Disciplinary, Multi-disciplinary, Trans-disciplinary, conventional and community based participatory research methods and tools can be used in an innovative way beyond boundaries to critically analyse the issues of the people and suggest solutions to the problems of the people.

Deliberations on '75 Years of Swaraj India' can be organised in following mode:

- (a) Pre-Congress Nation-wide Seminar/Symposia/Group discussions.
- (b) During the XLVI ISSC in 8-plenaris, 5-special/public lectures/interdisciplinary deliberations in 28 subjects Research Committees and 21 interdisciplinary Thematic Panels and Task Force.
- (c) Post XLVI ISSC nation-wide seminar/symposia/group discussions. Post-XLVI ISSC deliberations may be continued for two-three years.

In this Congress, apart from the researcher's and scientist's presentations and plenary lectures, representatives from political parties, civil society organisations, media, industrial groups, farmer's associations will be invited to present their views, perceptions and perspectives on the above theme. Before the annual Congress, there will be a pre-congress symposium on different subjects on the theme of the annual Congress. The pre-congress symposium would be conducted in various research and higher learning institutions. All academic deliberations will be published in the form of occasional papers/monographs/books in all Indian languages through reputed Indian publishers.

09. Proposal

The Indian Social Science Academy (ISSA) has set up National Academic Advisory Committee for enabling it to formulate appropriate issues, help identity eminent scientists, thinkers, policy planners, social activists, etc. It has also constituted 28 subjects Research Committees with outstation and local chairpersons, conveners, 15-30 members from all over India. Bharathidasan University has constituted an Organising Committee under the chairmanship of its Vice-chancellor for organisation planning. ISSA has also requested all the Vice-chancellors/Directors to extend their active support in planning and organising local/regional seminars/symposia in local language. All members of ISSA too have been requested to organise one or twolocal level seminars/symposia. One of the Vice-Presidents have been put in charge of Organising State-wise deliberations in cooperation with respective Governments. Another Vice-President is entrusted to interact with all political parties, national and regional and invite them to put their appraisal of 75 Years of Swaraj India in writing. A two-three day national deliberations will be held in Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi. Government of India will be requested to facilitate by providing appropriate logistic and financial support. A conference of all Vice-chancellors/Directors/Advisors too may be held. All these are very difficult but very important for evolving scientific knowledge, theory and methods for reshaping the future of Swaraj India.

The deliberations may continue for next two or three years. Such deliberations have never been held in any country in the past. However, ISSA did organise one deliberation during the Golden Jubilee of Swaraj India. Result is published in book on 'Fifty Years of Freedom of India: State, Nation and People'.

What stands in the way of such a gigantic task is huge financial resource which ISSA doesn't have. It is, however, hoped that the State and Central Governments, philanthropists, big and small industries and peoples in general would extend their support to ISSA. If it so happens results will be highly satisfying to all Indians irrespective of their Class-Caste-Creed-Gender-Region and if acted upon Swaraj India may once again become the wonder that India was.

10. Publications

It is proposed to bring out as many volumes or at least a few volumes of selected papers in all Indian languages for enabling the people to know and act as they wish to create Swaraj India. All volumes in the electronic form in the website of the ISSA in a downloadable form on a payment basis by avoiding the print form with the perspective of environmental protection.

BHARATHIDASAN UNIVERSITY

Bharathidasan University established in February 1982, was named after the great revolutionary Tamil Poet, Bharathidasan (1891-1964). The motto of the University "We will create a brave new world" has been framed from Bharathidasan's poetic words "புதியதோர் உலகம் செய்வோம்". The University endeavours to be true to such a vision by creating in the region a brave new world of academic innovation for social change.

The University's main Campus was initially located in a sprawling area of over 1000 acres in Palkalaiperur. However, as years passed on, the South Campus at Palkalaiperur with the available infrastructure was donated to the newly started Anna University of Technology. Very recently, another portion of the land has been allotted to the Indian Institute of Management (IIM), Tiruchirappalli. Also, the University has a downtown campus at Khajamalai, which housed originally the Autonomous Post-Graduate Centre of the University of Madras at Tiruchirappalli. In addition to the administrative complex, which includes the Vice-Chancellor's Secretariat, Registrar's Office, Finance and Examination offices, most of the academic departments and research laboratories are located in the main Palkalaiperur Campus. Among the academic units in the Palkalaiperur Campus are Schools of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Life Sciences, Basic Medical Sciences, Geosciences, Social Sciences, Marine Sciences and the Schools of Languages. In addition, the Campus also has the Central Library, University Informatics Centre, Hostels, Staff Quarters, Health Centre, Canteen and others. The downtown campus has the Departments of Social Work, Computer Science, the Centre for Remote Sensing, the UGC-Human Resource Development Centre (Formerly UGC-Academic Staff College) and others. Besides these, the Bharathidasan Institute of Management popularly known as BIM (adjudged as one of the top business schools in the country) is located within the BHEL premises, a public sector undertaking at Tiruverumbur.

The University has totally 4 Faculties, 16 Schools, 37 Departments and 29 Specialized Research Centres. There are 263 faculty members catering to 2564 students and scholars in the University. The University Departments/Schools are offering 151 programmes including 40 PG programmes in M.A., M.Sc. and M.Tech. The above programmes are conducted under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in Semesters: 31 M.Phil., 33 Ph.D., 19 P.G. Diploma, 11 Diploma and 10 Certificates. The University's supporting staff strength is 457. In addition to the regular teaching programmes in the Departments and Schools, the University under its Distance Education mode is conducting 15 UG and 26 PG programmes. All the UG and PG programmes are conducted under non-semester system and MCA and MBA programmes are conducted under semester system along with the regular programmes. The MCA and MBA programmes conducted under this mode are very popular.



About Tiruchirappalli

Bharathidasan University is located in the historic town of Tiruchirappalli. Located on the banks of the river of the Cauvery, the ancient town, shortly called as Trichy with a history that dates back to 2500 years was ruled by the Cholas, the Pallayas and the Pandyas and it was also under the controlled by Mughals, Vijayanagra empire and local chieftains such as Nayaks of Madurai, Marathas and Nawabs of Carnatic. Under the British, the city acquired the characters of modern city as it was second largest after Madras. During the freedom struggle, Trichy played a prominent role so much so that C. Raja Gopalachari organized the Vedharanyam Salt Satyagraha, parallel to the Dandi March. After independence, cities grew fast and became the hub of industrial and educational institutions. Large scale industrial enterprises of eminence like Bharat Heavy Electrical Limited (BHEL), Ordinance Factory (OFT) and other such industries enhanced the industrial profile of the city. Similarly, the city region and its outskirts are studded with educational institutions run by the centre and state. Trichy, now is a busy hub of industries of and academic institutions of long standing such as National Institute of Technology-Trichy (formerly Regional Engineering College) and Anna University (BIT Campus), ICAR - National Research Centre for Banana. The latest attractions are Indian Institute of Management - Trichy, Indian Institute of Information Technology, Tamil Nadu National Law University.

Tourist Attractions

Tiruchirappalli tourism offers a wide assortment of options from religious sites to historic places on all directions as detailed below:

• Kallanai Dam (The Grand Anicut): The Kallanai Dam is built across the flowing river Cauveri. It spans over 1079 feet and is over 66 feet wide. This ancient dam was originally constructed about 2000 years ago, and it is the oldest functional water regulator structure in the entire country. It is constructed with rough stones, but they have been indigenously supporting the dam's structure for over 200 decades.

• Rock Fort: The Rock Fort played a major part in the Carnatic wars that was a major battle that helped establish the British Rule in India. The fort also has the famous Ucchi Pillayar Temple which was built in the 7th century and stands 83 meters high atop a rock in the fort complex. The cave temples, dedicated to Lord Shiva and Parvathi (Thayumanavar and Mattuvarkuzhalammai), built by the Pallavas in 508 AD are the oldest structure in the fort. Distance from BDU: 23 Km

- **Sri Ranganathaswamy Temple:** The <u>Sri Ranganathaswamy temple</u>, located in the river island of Sri Rangam (formed by the rivers Cauvery and Kollidam) was built between the 6th and the 9th centuries by the Azhwar Saints. The temple is dedicated to Lord Vishnu and is the first of the 108 Divya Desams or Vishnu Temples in the world. The temple complex is spread across 156 acres and is built in the Dravidian style of architecture. The temple gopuram is 72 meters in height and consists of 72 tiers. - **Jambukeshwara Temple:** The <u>Jambukeshwara Temple</u> is one of the 5 major temples in Tamil Nadu which are dedicated to the Lord Shiva. The temple was built in Dravidian style of architecture by the Cholas in the 2nd century AD. The marvellous stone carvings depict the various mythological events and are fine examples of the artists' stone carving mastery.

• Samayapuram Temple: Sri Mariamman Temple situated at Samayapuram on NH-45 is one of the popular temples in the state of Tamil Nadu. Sri Mariyamman Temple is dedicated to Samayapurathal or Mariamman, an incarnation of Goddess Shakti. The main deity in the sanctum is made of sand and clay and hence there are no abhishekams conducted to the main deity, but instead the abishekam is done to the small stone statue in front of it.

• Our Lady of Lourdes Church: Our Lady of Lourdes Church is one of the oldest and the most beautiful churches in South India. It was built in 1792 by Schwartz. It is in the center of the town near the Teppakulam, Rock Fort and Main Guard Gate, inside the premises of the St. Joseph college. This is an important colonial era church in Trichy.

• Hazrat Thable Alam Badhusa Nathervali Dargah: An important mosque, built on the spot, where Nathar Shaw, (969–1039), also called Nadir Shah or Nathar Wali, was buried. He was a Muslim mystic and preacher from the Middle East who migrated to Tamil Nadu in the 11th-century, where he travelled from area to area to preach the faith of Islam to the locals.

• Railway Museum: The Railway Museum-cum-Railway Heritage Centre is one of the best places in Trichy for students and train lovers. The museum exhibits train related equipment, old artefacts, digital archives like maps, railway manuals, documents and photographs of South India's railway heritage. The outdoor sections exhibit a functional toy train and vintage locomotive engines.

• Rani Mangammal Palace: The Palace houses the Government Museum. Named after the Rani Mangammal, a queen regent of the Madurai Nayak kingdom was built by Chokkanatha Nayak, the then ruler of Madurai. It was also known as the Durbar Hall of the Madurai Nayaks, when Tiruchirapally was their capital from 1616 to 1634 and later from 1665 to 1731. The museum contains a wide array of exhibits relating to geology, zoology, paintings, anthropology, epigraphy and history.

• **Butterfly Park:** The Tropical Butterfly Conservatory, considered as the largest Butterfly Park in Asia, is located in the Upper Anaicut reserve forest in Melur, Srirangam. It covers 25 acres. The conservatory lies in the river Cauvery and Kollidam drainage basin. The Conservatory consists of Butterfly Park and Nakshatravanam (star forest). This park is. Distance from BDU: 34 Km

• Chithanavasal: Maintained by the Archaeological Survey of India, Chithanavasal cave paintings and Jain 'beds' are interesting places to visit. The paintings are inside an old Jain temple. It is located on the Annavasal – Pudukottai Road at a distance of 17 km from Pudukottai. In ancient days the Jain Monks used to live in cave and hillocks so as to perform their ascetic life. They polished the hill for the purpose of poojas and penance in the open shelter. Such a type of Jain temple and Jain beds are found here and the rare Brahmi Tamil

script inscriptions are found near the beds. The ceiling of the temple are full of Fresco herbal paintings. These paintings are considered to be next to Ajantha cave Paintings.

INDIAN SOCIAL SCIENCE ACADEMY

The Indian Social Science Academy (ISSA when abbreviated) is the first National Science Academy of independent Democratic Republic of India and fourth in chronicle order. The other three National Science Academies—Indian National Science Academy (INSA), Indian Academy of Sciences (IAS) and National Science Academy of India (NSAI) were born in British India. ISSA was born, 48 years ago, on August 15, 1974 at University of Allahabad in an assembly of young scientists. August 15, 1974 symbolizes a beginning of an altogether new science reflecting democratic values needs, aspirations, creative urges / potentialities, history, culture and traditions of peoples of India. Its name was carefully chosen for reflecting the true meaning and function of science. The setting up of the Indian Social Science Academy also heralded a beginning of a new movement for unity of science of Nature-Humans-Society by forging unity among all branches of science. Many described it as a *barometer* of science and society in India, in particular and world in general. In more than one sense ISSA is a unique body in the whole world. Toady the Indian Social Science Academy is unique among all Science Academies in the world as it brings all subjects of science under one umbrella.

Science means objective knowledge of non-living and living things / objects and knowledge means answer to questions 'what', 'how' and 'why', about a thing / object. The word 'Nature' connotes all forms of objects / things / matter including humans and societies. Nature-Humans-Society form one single continuum. So division of science into physics, chemistry, biology, environment, ecology, agriculture, medical, social, historical etc., is artificial and all such divisions provide partial objective knowledge of Nature-Humans-Society. Unity of Science of Nature-Humans-Society, therefore, is necessary for having correct and full understanding of Nature-Human-Society science. Thus, viewed science is unitary as well as uniting.

The Science as an objective knowledge of non-living and living objects / things / matter is produced through collective mental and physical labour of men and women. What is the result of collective labour is termed as **social** and what is **social is public and not private**. Science, therefore, is **social**. It springs in society comprising men and women. **Because it is social it has social functions**. It has the prime role in enabling men and women to enjoy higher quality of material, social and cultural life in harmony with Nature. However, all such social functions of science filter through different groups in the society because of which one doesn't find one-to-one relationship between science and conditions of all men and women of all societies. Humans' inability to create a science-based society is well reflected in modern societies all over the world.

The Indian Social Science Academy seeks to discover, develop and disseminate science of Nature-Humans-Society in Indian conditions in particular, and world conditions in general, with a mission to build a new Democratic Republic of India few world over where there is no hunger, no poverty, no unemployment, no illiteracy, no disease, no bigotry, no superstitions, no communalism, no casteism and no discrimination of any form and where all men, women and children enjoy equally good quality of material, social, cultural and spiritual life in harmony with Nature without any kind of fear of violence, rape and murder. Its mission in pursuing science of Nature-Human-Society is for creating an altogether new world order which is free from hunger, poverty, diseased, hatred and war and which is rooted in princi-ples of reciprocity, equality, freedom and fraternity.

'Love to All, Prejudice None' is the Philosophy of Science which guides all scientific pursuits of ISSA. ISSA urges all scientists to puruse science without politics.

Founders of the Indian Social Science Academy thought that science can benefit the peoples of a given society only when it is taught, researched and communicated in their own language. Communication of scientific research and science education in people's own language, therefore, is key to the unfolding of creative potentialities of peoples and benefiting them. Unfortunately, even after 75 years of independence science in India is communicated through English. The end result is peoples of India who fund all scientific research are deprived of its benefits. The creativity in science in India is continuously declining. The Indian Social Science Academy., therefore, seeks to change it by creating necessary conditions for communication of scientific research and science education in Indian languages involving publication of research journals, monographs, books, etc., in all Indian languages.
